

Associate of Arts

The Associate of Arts degree with a field of study in philosophy offers students the opportunity to combine the core curriculum with an emphasis in philosophy. The two-year program is fully transferrable and provides a strong foundation to continue your bachelor's degree studies at a four-year university.

What is philosophy? Philosophy is the intellectual tradition that has guided the attempt to address fundamental questions of life: Is there a God? What is the nature of the soul? How can I live my best life? What are my obligations and relationships to other people, my community, and the environment?

Why study philosophy? You'll learn about the historical attempts to answer these questions and begin to formulate the answers for your own life. While engaged in this endeavor, you'll acquire important, useful, and marketable skills such as problem-solving, writing, distinguishing fact from opinion, thinking rationally and critically, and analyzing and organizing complex information.

What can I do with a Philosophy degree? A lot more than you think! Philosophy majors have built successful careers in computer science, education, business, government and non-profits. If you're considering an advanced degree, philosophy is the perfect background for law school or seminary studies as well as for graduate study in philosophy.
